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# WHY THE CURRICULUM IS CHANGING

- Today's children and young people are growing up in an increasingly complex world and living their lives seamlessly on and offline. This presents many positive and exciting opportunities, but also challenges and risks. In this environment, children and young people need to know how to be safe and healthy and how to manage their academic, personal and social lives in a positive way.
- The Children and Social Work Act 2017 introduced a new legislation on Relationships Education,
   Relationships and Sex Education, and Health Education in Schools.
- Safeguarding Children is at the heart of Relationships and Sex Education.

## WHY RELATIONSHIPS & SEX EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS IS IMPORTANT

High quality RSE helps create safe school communities in which students can grow, learn, and develop positive, healthy behaviour for life, and the following reasons:

- RSE plays a vital part in schools fulfilling their statutory duties to protect and safeguard their students. Ofsted is clear that schools must have a preventative programme that enables students to learn about safety and risks in relationships.
- Schools maintain a statutory obligation under the Children Act (2004) to promote their students' wellbeing and under the Education Act (2002) to prepare children and young people for the challenges, opportunities and responsibilities of adult life. A comprehensive RSE programme can have a positive impact on students' health and wellbeing and their ability to achieve and can play a crucial part in meeting these obligations.
- Technology is evolving at a tremendous pace. The need to protect children and young people from inappropriate online content, cyber-bullying and exploitation is a growing concern. A comprehensive RSE programme can support in addressing these issues.

## RELATIONSHIPS & SEX EDUCATION

AN INTRODUCTION

- 'Relationships' education will be compulsory for all primary age pupils from September 2020 many schools will opt to teach the content in Summer Term 2021.
- Health education will be compulsory for all pupils in all state funded schools.
- Teaching at school will complement (not replace) and reinforce the lessons families teach their children as they grow up.
- At Five Spires Academy we aim to flexibly and inclusively deliver any content in a way that is age and developmentally appropriate with respect to the backgrounds and beliefs of pupils and parents while always with the aim of providing pupils with the knowledge they need to be safe.

## RELATIONSHIPS EDUCATION IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS

- Relationships Education is introduced at Primary and students explore the following areas:
  - √ Families and people who care for me
  - √ Caring Friendships
  - √ Respectful Relationships
  - √ Online Relationships
  - ✓ Being Safe
- The Department for Education continues to recommend that all Primary schools offer a sex education programme. Sex education is not compulsory in Primary schools and parents have a right to withdraw their child from the dedicated 'sex education' lessons; however, we advise asking to see the teaching content before making this decision.



- Jay always gets told to kiss his grandma when she comes over. He really doesn't want to but feels like he has to and feels like he can't say anything.







- All of these subjects should be and are set in the context of a wider whole-school approach to supporting pupils to be safe, happy and prepared for life beyond school.
- For example, the curriculum on relationships and sex complements, and is supported by, the school's wider policies on behaviour, inclusion, respect for equality and diversity, bullying and safeguarding.
- At the heart of Relationships Education,
  Relationships and Sex Education and Health
  Education, there is a focus on keeping children safe
  and the role that schools can play in preventative
  education.
